

Regular meeting of the Board of Selectmen convened at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, May 2, 2017 in Room 34, the Harry B. Butters Chambers, Norwood Memorial Municipal Building, with the Pledge of Allegiance, and a silent moment of prayer and reflection. Meeting is Recorded.

Present: Chairman William J. Plasko, Helen Abdallah Donohue, Paul A. Bishop, and Thomas F. Maloney. Also present General Manager John J. Carroll, Clerk Frances L. Jessoe and Assistant Christina Mulvehill.

#### Appointments

7:00 P.M. – Chief Anthony J. Greeley, NFD:

Reference was made to monthly report of department's activities. Chief Greeley congratulated Selectmen Bishop and Howard on their election victories and Chairman Plasko on the Chairmanship. He proceeded to outline his report of monthly activities. He explained that this report is for the month of March and he will have the April numbers when he is next in. In regard to substitution shortfalls, he feels he will be able to remedy them with strategies he has discussed with Mr. Carroll. He brought together the accounting department and the new billing service. He expressed his condolences to the families of two retired members, long time firefighter Pat Palie and long-time business manager Barbara Rizzo. Happy 102<sup>nd</sup> birthday to retired Deputy Fire Chief John Howard.

The Board adjourned from the Selectmen's Meeting in order to hold the rate hearing as Electric Light Commissioners.

#### ELECTRIC LIGHT COMMISSIONER'S MEETING

7:15 P.M. – P.H. Light Department, Supt. James Collins:

Re: Electric Rate Adjustment-notice was read and public hearing was declared open.

The Manager introduced Roger Cotte who is a consultant in the power field. He is here to help the Board and the public understand why we are having a rate increase.

Mr. Collins introduced Dan Morrissey, Kevin Shaughnessy and Jason Haber. He explained that the light department was established in 1907 and operated as a business and like any business must cover the cost of the product itself. The electric supply cost is rising dramatically and the Light Department must raise its rates to cover the cost. They have not had an increase since 2014 and they are trying to minimize this by using the rate stabilization fund. The proposed increase would be 5.9% June 1 and 5.9% January 1, 2018. Mr. Collins said these are known costs in the power pool. The proposal has been reviewed by the Future Power Supply Needs Committee who members are Harry Spence, William Plasko, Al Fiske, Paul Donohue, Mark Ryan, Tim McDonough and Joseph Michienzi.

Mr. Cotte explained the presentation which has been shortened to highlight the major points. He said that the two components are locally controlled costs which are 18% and the other component is costs controlled by others which is 82%. The main driver is the costs not controlled by the department and that is what is rising dramatically. He presented the slide presentation explaining the reasons for the increase. Energy costs for the department are very stable. The reasons for increase are capacity prices. These prices are set by the ISO (independent systems operator). These prices are set by ISO and there is nothing we can do about it. Power Point presentation continued. Commissioner Donohue inquired what made it go up so much. Mr. Cotte said that the capacity charges are determined by the generation in New England and utilities that supply power retire the units when they feel it is appropriate and you have to build new units. We are paying for new power plants. Chairman Plasko said this effects everyone not just Norwood.

P.H. Light Department (cont'd):

Selectman Maloney said this is a generation type of thing. Mr. Cotte said it is not predictable because you don't know when they are going to retire the old plants. Over the long run it will save money. Power point presentation continued. Mr. Cotte stated that the recommendation of the Light Department (which he and the Future Purchase of Power Committee supports) is to institute the smallest increase that is necessary to meet the town and the Light Department needs as per the following; Effective June 1, 2017 – 5.9% increase; tentatively plans a 5.9% increase January 1, 2018 and the reason this is at this level they will draw down the rate stabilization fund fully to pay for as much of this as they can-they will take 2 million in FY 2018 and \$1 million in 2019 and then they will have to build this back up as this will bring it down to very low levels.

Selectman Maloney inquired what the balance is in the stabilization account. Mr. Collins said that it is approximately \$3.7 million. Chairman Plasko said we have to work on this in the future. Selectman Bishop inquired what will it cost the average resident in Norwood. It will be about \$10 more with both increases.

Selectman Donohue said in the beginning when she heard they were coming in for a rate increase she was very worried as she tries to protect the people in town, but having all of this information shows her that the Town doesn't have a choice in this matter. It is out of our hands and she thanked them for finding a way to make it less painful for all the people in Town. This is a result of ISO. It is out of our hands. Thank you for the work and thank the Committee.

Chairman Plasko read the following statement of the Future Purchase of Power Committee into the record  
Re: Recommendation Regarding Proposed Rate Increase.

“The Committee met on April 27, 2017 and discussed the factors driving the increased capacity costs and transmission costs for the New England Region. The committee reviewed the Capacity Cost tripling over the next two years. We emphasize that these costs are already set by the New England utilities. The Committee also reviewed transmission cost and accepts the fact that these costs will be continuing on an increasing cost slope for the foreseeable future as a result of the projects in New England that have been planned and approved for construction for the next several years,. We point out that these costs are already set by the transmission owning utilities. The committee recognized the validity of these cost and the lack of control of them by the department and the departments need to replenish its rate stabilization account. Therefore the committee supports the two step increase of 5.9% on all bills effective June 1, 2017, with an additional 5.9% increase on all bills after January 1, 2018 as proposed by the Norwood Municipal Light Department.-William J. Plasko, Acting Chairman

Commissioner Bishop asked about LED savings for the public. Mr. Collins said when it is completed they will save \$150,000 per year.

Chairman Plasko, inquired if anyone for the public would like to speak in favor or against.

Seeing none, on motion of Commissioner Donohue, seconded by Commissioner Bishop, voted to close the hearing.

On motion of Selectman Bishop, seconded by Selectman Donohue, voted the following: The Board of Selectmen, acting in their capacity as Electric Light Commissioners, voted to approve electric rate increases as recommended by the Municipal Light Department. An increase of 5.9% for all rates effective with all bills rendered after June 1, 2017 and a second increase of 5.9% for all rates effective with all bills rendered after January 1, 2018. The Commissioners also agree to the modified language of Rate R-18-General Purpose Rate as recommended, and the proposal to include the addition of LED Streetlights to Rate O, the Outdoor Lighting Rate.

The Board continued on to the business of the Selectmen's Meeting.
